Associate National Grand Chaplain, Independent Benevolent Protection Order of Elks. Member, American Academy of Clergymen. Held preacting missions in South America and Scandinavia. Author of 20 books in field of Psychology of Religion. Internationally famous in field. Member Nat'l.
