The Place of the Theological Seminary in Denominational Life

The importance of a theological seminary in denominational life is worthy of our most careful consideration. Such a seminary might well be compared to a fountain of water, flowing into a valley, and bringing its blessings into many homes, watering many farms, and supplying a necessity of life to many people.

The theological seminary is a fountain of knowledge concerning God and God's kingdom on earth, received from revelation through God's word. This knowledge of God and His kingdom is needed in every human life, every home, church, school, and institution which seeks the uplift of humanity.

The work of the Foreign Mission Board waits upon volunteers who have received their inspiration and training at the seminary. The missionary must be taught missions and methods before he is qualified for his task.

Home Missions, and the task of winning the homeland for Christ, is dependent on workers trained at the seminary. Christian education is made possible through leaders and workers properly prepared with a theological background.

The work of the Sunday School Publishing Board, the Training Union, the Woman's Missionary Union, and the Baptist Brotherhood, is dependent on leaders properly trained and equipped with Biblical knowledge and Christian methods of promotion.

Individual churches in need of pastors, educational leaders, choir directors, and religious workers must look to the seminary for properly trained laborers. "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few", said Jesus. And the laborers are few because only a few have been trained for the great task.

Surely the theological seminary is a living fountain of divine knowledge and inspiration which pours forth its blessings to all parts of the denominational program, and sends consecrated missionaries to needy places at home and abroad.

Because of its great importance to denominational life and the promotion of God's kingdom the theological seminary should have adequate support for its work. Unlike other schools it does not charge tuition to its students. Instruction is given free. Board, room, books, and necessary fees compose the items for which students are asked to pay. But the teachers must be paid. The cost of instruction per pupil in theological training is approximately \$1,-

It is so easy to tabulate our losses, to remember our hurts, to retain our scars, but oftentimes, too difficult to observe our gains, to count our blessings, and above all, to remember daily that every day brings a problem, and that many times each source of embarrassment is followed by an almost unbelievable source of emergence of the individual, a redemption of the whole self, and a salvation of the soul. Whatever hurts us, often heals us. To understand this is one of the greatest achievements of the Christian religion.

As I greet you as friends who have shown yourselves friendly towards the Seminary in any way, and as we near the close of the year, I wish you to know that we realize that you have not only shared your time, your interest and your gifts, but your

With the first and second chapel periods of the current school term utilized by the director of the chapel and the academic dean respectively, we observed Convocation Day on Thursday, September 22nd, with representatives from the various educational institutions of the city of Nashville and the Seminary board of trustees participating. This year a different plan of arrangement from that of previous years was observed, in that active participants on the program were requested to represent classes or types of institutions rather than speaking simply for one institution. Dr. William K. Grobel of the Vanderbilt School of Religion was the speaker for the schools of religion in all the institutions of the city which operate such a school. Dr. Harold D. West, president of Meharry Medical College, represented business and professional schools, while Professor Clifton L. Hall of the Peabody College faculty spoke for colleges and universities, and the Rev. Kelly Miller Smith, pastor of First Baptist Church, 8th Avenue, and Chairman of the executive committee of the trustee board of the Seminary spoke for that group.

Persons from other institutions, represented in the categories named above, but who did not speak were: Dr. Carl A. Dent of the Riverside Sanitarium, Miss M. Buckmon, of the National School of Business, and Dr. William L. Crump, of A & I State University. There was the general feeling that this new arrangement added both conciseness and dignity to the occasion.

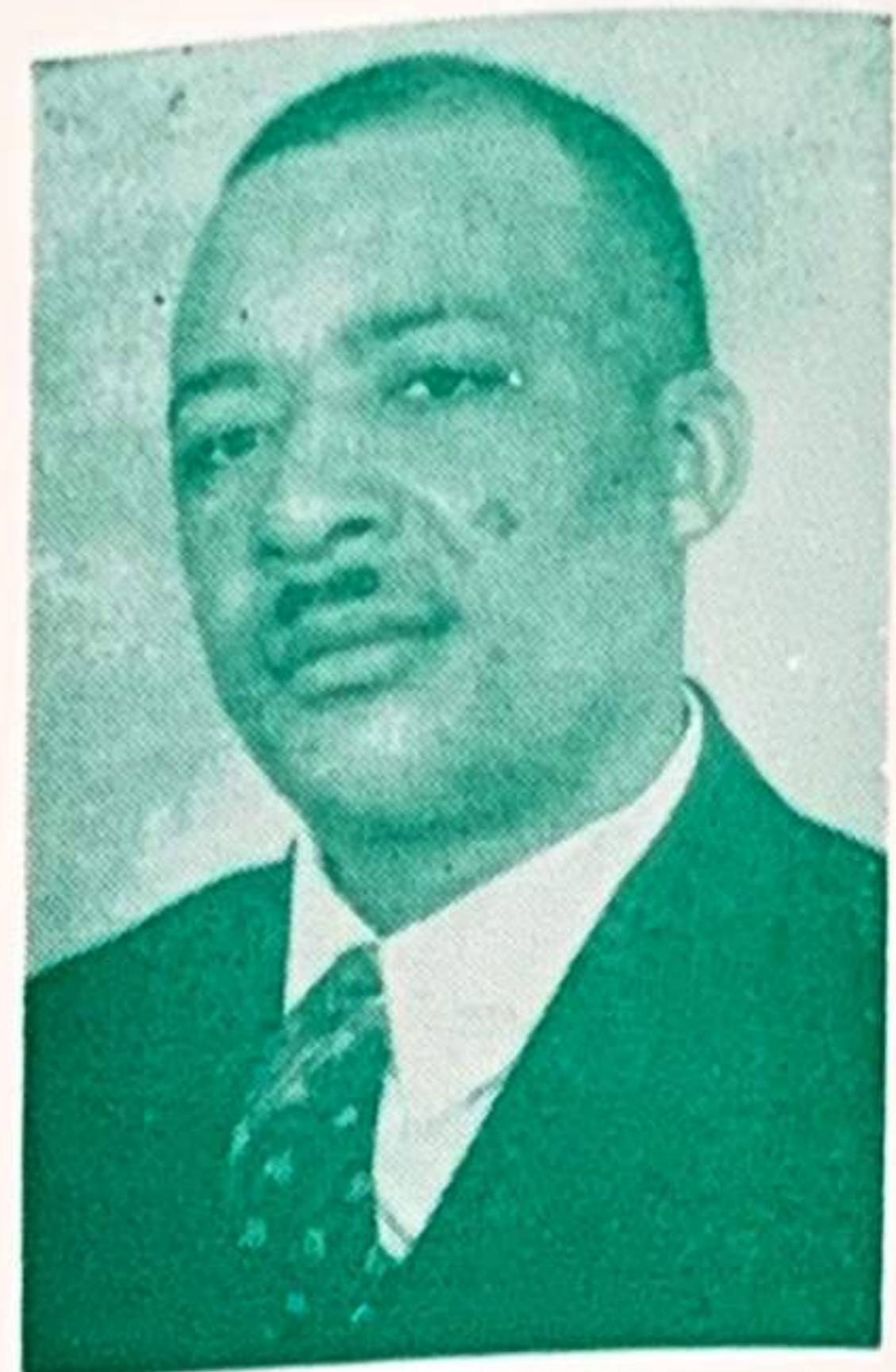

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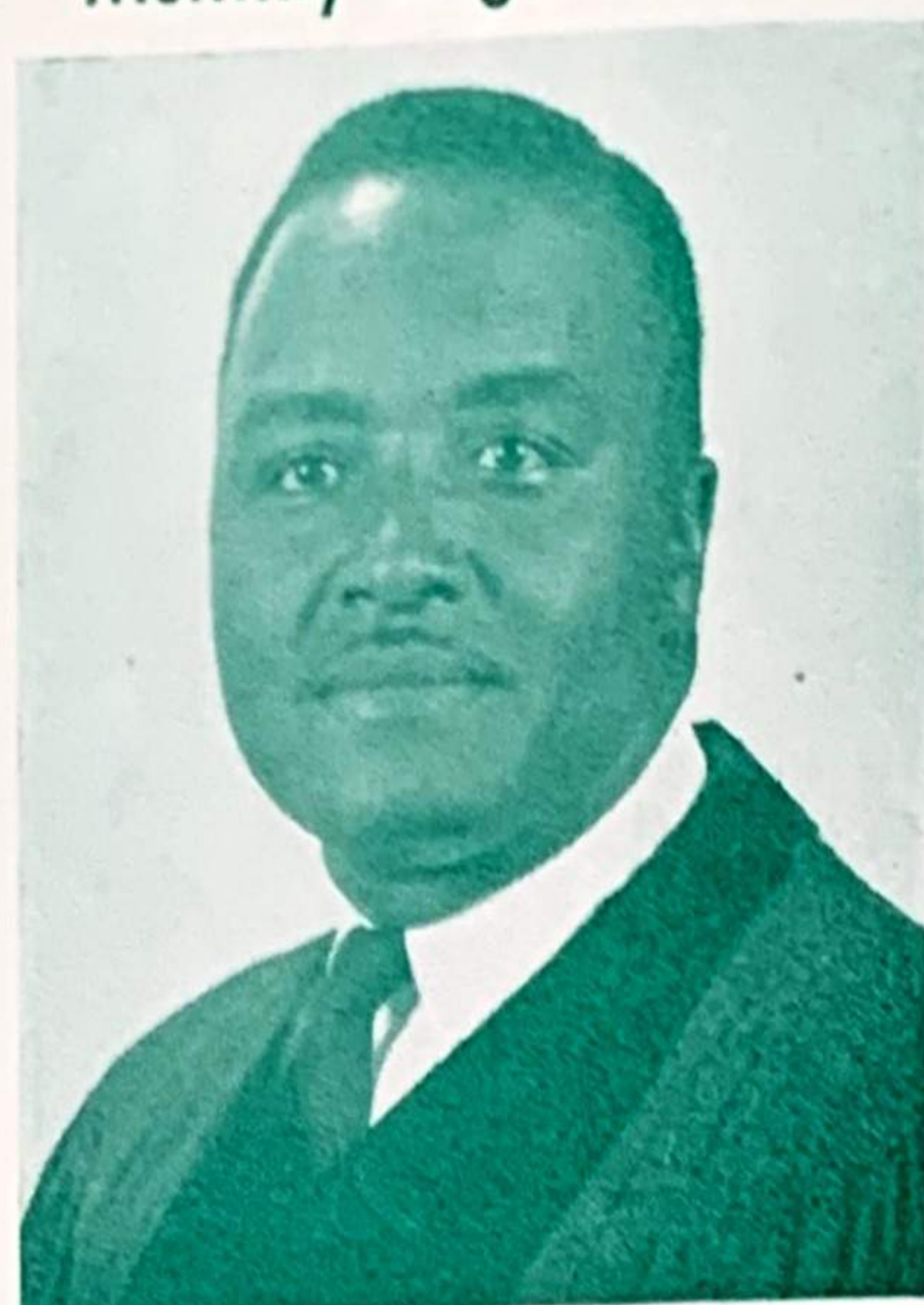

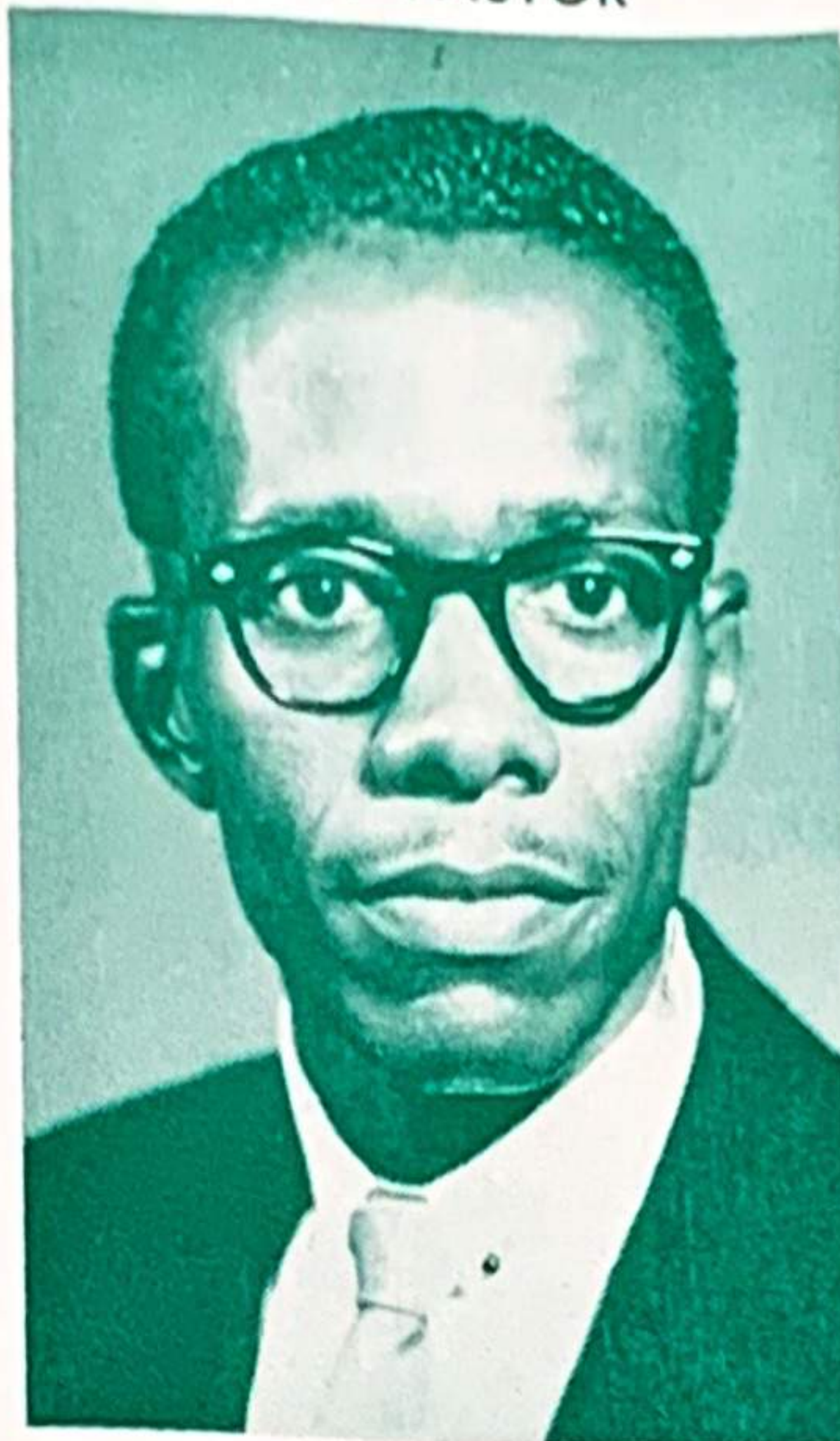
