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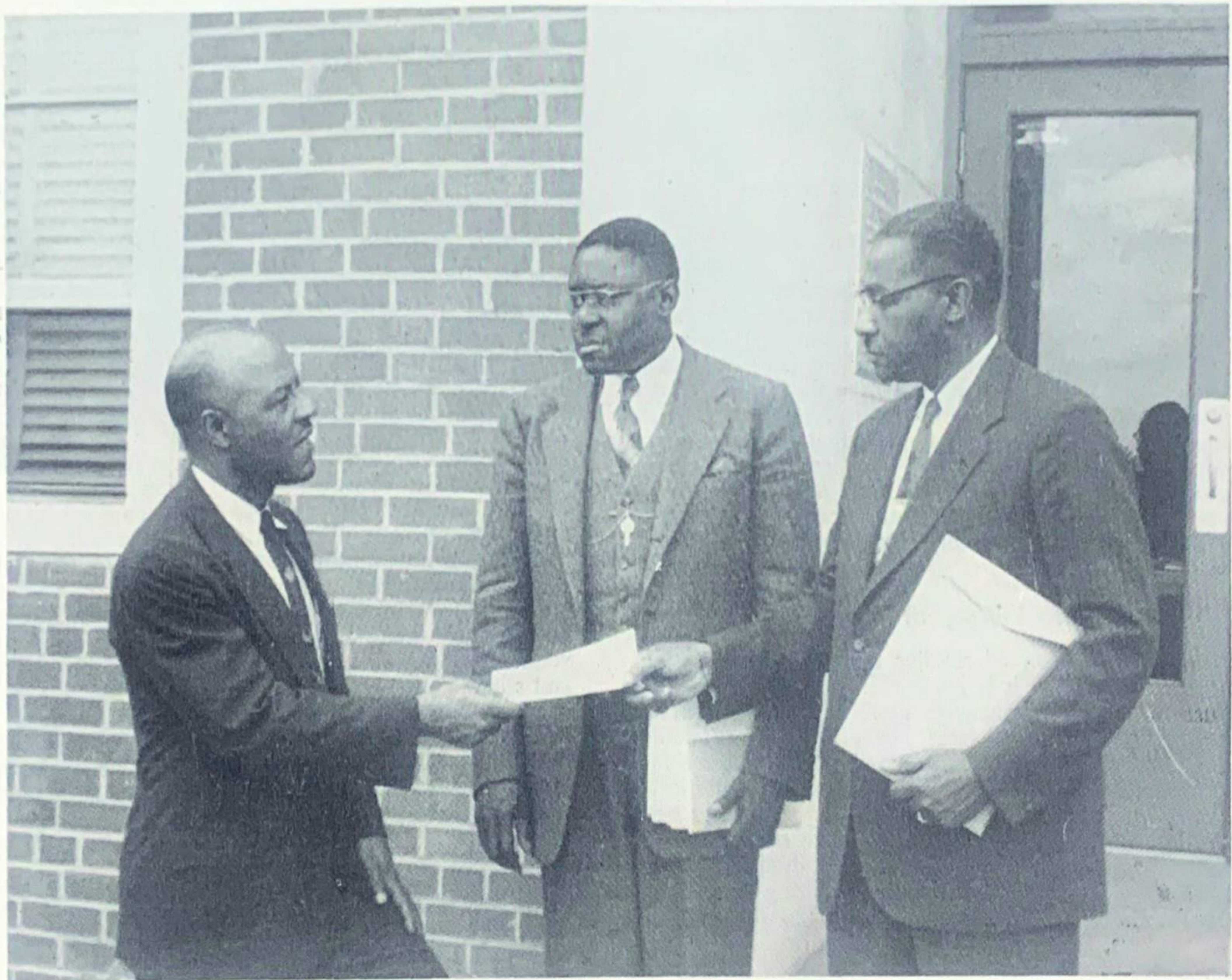

The Fifty Thousand Dollar Campaign Moves Forward

The Motive Behind the Movement

I am sure our readers know by this time that we are in the midst of a \$50,000 Financial Campaign and we are striving feverishly to reach this goal by September 30, 1954. Therefore, it again becomes my duty to relate to you that up to this time the Seminary's \$50,000 Campaign which we would call a financial drive, but which Dr. J. H. Jackson, President of our Convention and who initiated the drive, has chosen to call a movement is living up to that name in every sense of the word.

Not only are we receiving unprecedented cooperation financially, but the cause of Christian Education and the American Baptist Theological Seminary are being heralded in a way and to an extent never known before, perhaps never in the history of our Convention—I am sure not since my first arrival in National Convention circles with the Jubilee Session in Chicago in 1930, almost a quarter of a century. It is a healthy sign of not only church growth, but race progress when the convention moves once again in the interest of education and missions, the two main causes without which the church would not be able to rightly justify its existence.

Extensive Publicity Program

Since the launching of the Campaign in September, 1953, immediately after our Miami session and with the Dallas Regional Meeting held in March, 1954 in our initial effort, we have made elaborate efforts by way of printed matter and publicity to reach our B.T.U.s, Sunday schools, laymen, our Women's State Auxiliary Conventions, churches and conventions to inform our constituency of this major Convention effort under its new administration. This has not only been an extensive, but an expensive Campaign. Despite the fact that we have received additional assistance in the employment of Miss Primrose Funches as Co-Director of the Campaign, it has nevertheless taxed the personnel and financial resources of the Seminary in an unusual way, but I am happy to state that the cooperation shown by the administration of the Seminary and constituency of the Convention, as well as the results we are now achieving, have not only been enjoyable and helpful, but are far exceeding the strenuousness of the effort undertaken.

Complete Listing of Contributors

With the exception of smaller contributions less than fifty cents and where it is impossible to know the donors because of some organizations' method of sending a full check for funds received and not giving us the names of those who have given, we are sending individual receipts with a letter of thanks and giving credit for the same to all persons participating in the Campaign, as has always been the policy of The Seminary in the office of the Bursar. Each list of the "SEMINARIAN" will carry a duplicate listing, and we are now in the process of preparing a complete report for the Board of Directors meeting at the Birmingham Congress, from September 1, 1953 through June 15, 1954, inclusive.

At our annual session in St. Louis, Missouri, we shall have a complete record of all contributions and the contributors for distribution. The report will cover the period of September 1, 1953 to September 1, 1954, and we would appreciate it if any corrections would be called to our attention before this date.

Continued Effort Necessary

From all over the nation we are receiving contributions, pledges and promises of later action which evidences the

fact that National Baptists are behind this Campaign in a wholehearted manner. But with our annual session being a little more than two months away, to be exact, two months and twenty-six days, it is obvious that we cannot relax our efforts one bit at this time.

We are therefore asking you to do your best at the Sunday school and B.T.U. Congress and on through the summer up to St. Louis. National Baptists cannot afford to fail in this Campaign. Let's do this one big thing now for our Seminary. Right now, I am almost persuaded that we are going to actually raise this \$50,000. We can, and we will. Watch National Baptists do it!

Convention Officials

On April 30, President J. H. Jackson and Secretary L. G. Carr of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, visited the Seminary and held with President R. W. Riley, Mr. D. H. Ross, Bursar and Dr. L. S. Sedberry, Secretary of the Southern Baptist Commission on the Seminary, a fact-finding meeting on the financial status of the Seminary.

The conference dealt with the agreements and contracts in connection with the operation of the institution under the auspices of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated and the Southern Baptist Convention.

The visit of President Jackson and Secretary Carr began with a brief interview with Dr. Porter Routh, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Southern Baptist Convention, and ended with an extended meeting with the administrative officials of the Seminary in the conference room of the new \$115,000 Library constructed by the Southern Baptist Convention and equipped by the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, at a cost of \$17,000.00.

After a thorough discussion of matters pertaining to the Seminary and the financial obligation of the National Baptist Convention to the Seminary for the school year 1953-54, Dr. Jackson requested Treasurer Carr to present to President Ralph W. Riley a check for \$10,000 which was the exact amount of money promised by the National Baptist Convention for the school's fiscal year. The gesture not only brought a source of relief to the President of the Seminary, but by removing the National Baptist Convention's financial obligation, it more greatly encouraged and stimulated the relations between the two Conventions which support the Seminary.

After the presentation of the check, Drs. Sedberry and Riley expressed appreciation to the Convention officials, and Dr. J. H. Jackson left immediately for Chicago and Dr. L. G. Carr for Philadelphia.

DR. BROADDUS' QUOTES

"All that has been is yet to come into its own. The values of the past are to be determined by what we do today. However glorious the beginnings, they are to receive us into their completion."

"Our forefathers did not secure our liberty, they declared it; today we must say whether, as weaklings, we shall lose it, or as heroes we shall maintain this liberty . . . I think if the men of today do not know more than men of the past, they are a precious lot of fools."

"The real thing is not what a man can see or say, but what a man can be and do—and what he can inspire others to be and do. The value of a man to the world is measured by the degree in which his vision-truths shall get themselves, hands and feet, and walk the common highway with the common man."

"Even the fathers of the faith may not be perfect without our contribution. These men must all find their missions fulfilled in the magnificent work of this day and this hour to which you and every graduating class is called . . . Martin Luther's work is not finished. Much of his Reformation needs to be reformed. Much of his Protestantism needs to be protested against. Calvin's work is not ended. His was a message, but it was not final; it was

only a partial vision of the many gems of truth he never saw."

"We hear a lot today about revolution, but there is nothing so revolutionary because there is nothing so unnatural as the strain to keep things in their fixed place at a time when the world is moving ahead. New occasions teach new duties. Our lives, all too often, are so small for the larger vision."

"Unless we put our bricks into the wall, the building of the past will never be completed. Those who have gone before are crying out to us. Their cries are more than a command. Take up the task, and with courage and devotion go forth."

"This is our glorious heritage. Go from here and preach . . . preach the word! The world needs it today as never before. Preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Get all the information you can, science and philosophy and what not, but preach the Gospel. Whether they realize it or not, the world needs to hear the Gospel of the Lowly Nazarene. Go and preach, and as you preach, serve! Let your first concern be the glory of the cross of Calvary. And in preaching the Gospel truths, this glorious heritage of ours shall be passed on as a glorious legacy."

REV. POLLARD'S QUOTES

"If you want to know why Jesus attracted the multitudes, I believe you will find it in the fact that He loved them. Watch him as he stands at the grave of Lazarus and healing touch upon the leper, the blind, the deaf and witness. His compassion as He raised the dead. It seems to me that the classic example of compassion is Jesus weeping over the city of Jerusalem. If we are going to win people to Christ, we must care; care enough to pray; to worthily prepare our sermons; to walk steadfastly before men; and to preach with a fervency and a sincerity that goes far beyond a mere desire to 'fill the pulpit.'"

"God is a worker; Jesus was a hard worker when he walked upon the face of this earth. He is now making intercession for us. There isn't any conflict between spirituality and hard work. Some folk who think they are intensely spiritual are simply lazy."

"I firmly believe that every preacher ought to take an active part in civic affairs, but he ought not to become a community pack-horse. He can't major on Kiwanis, Rotary and other such activities and Evangelism at the same time. Pardon me, but I fear some have become so involved in denominational activities that they do not have time to keep the fires of compassion burning in their hearts."

"It is a tragedy when a preacher begins to take more interest in his text than in lost souls. It is interesting to see a text unfold; its mark of polished phrases, its linked sweetness long drawn out. But, if that sermon lacks direction, it is not preached with the right motive. It is a failure in spite of all that can be said."

New Administrative Office Space Provided

Following the completion and entering of our new T. L. Holcomb Library building, we immediately reconverted the space on the first floor in the J. B. Lawrence Administration Building, formerly used for the library, into a spacious conference and Directors' room, a mailing room, and offices and secretaries' rooms for the Academic Dean and the Dean of Men, respectively. These offices are completed in addition to offices already in use by the President and secretary, Registrar and secretary, Director of Extension, and Bursar, making a total of twelve rooms on the first floor now being used for administrative purposes alone.

The move not only reflects the interest and foresight of the administration to keep pace with the growing demands of an ever-expanding institution, but places its workers in a better position to carry on the administrative functions of the Seminary than ever. We welcome the much-needed changes and shall make great use of them.

Viduary Club Presents Library with Books

The library has received two gift books from the Viduary Club of Nashville. Mrs. Lewellyn Battle, manager of the Seminary's book store, is a member of the club and she suggested the project to the club—to give books by Negro authors to the library.

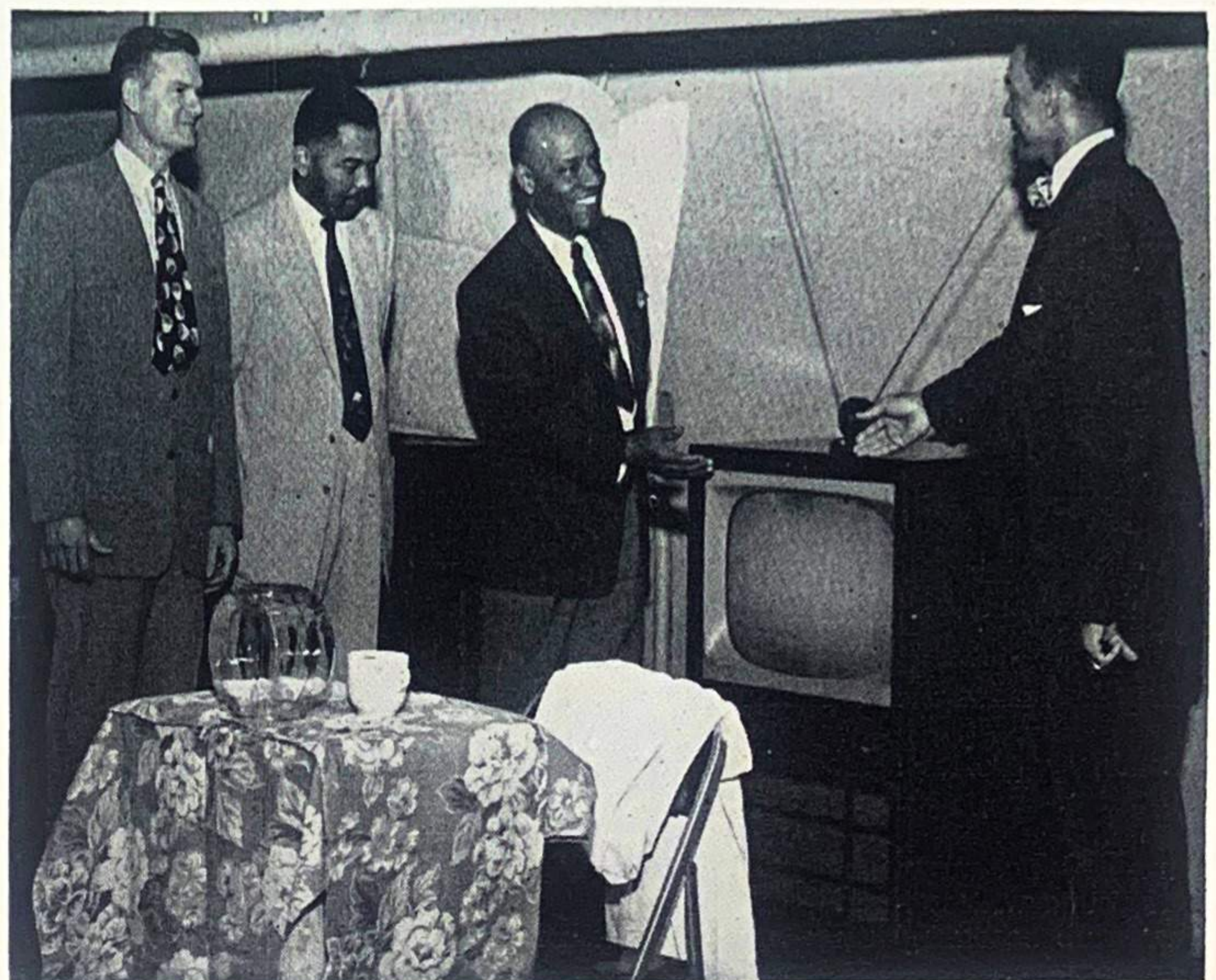
