Through it all, Dr. Cox presents himself as the very quintessence of intellectual excellence. The second, Dr. E. V. GARNETT, JAMES HENRY -- Clergyman, Educator b. Carter Plan-Gordon County, Georgia 1847; s. James K. and Levina (Carter Garnett; m. Ida Lee Drake, August 15, 1888; two children, Ida D. and James Malcom; educ. Oberlin (A.B. 1887) Morman Park, Illinois Theological Course (B.D. 1886); Selma University (D.D. 1891); Arkansas Baptist College (LL.D 1926); President, Arkansas Baptist College, Little Rock, Arkansas 1886-87; President and Co-founder, Gaudalupe College, Sequin, Texas, 1887-91; President State University (Simmons University) Louisville, Kentucky 1891-95; President Houston College, Houston, Texas 1894-99; Chairman of Languages (Greek and Latin) Lincoln University, Jefferson City, Missouri for nine years; In business in Gary, Indiana (real estate and insurance) until 1922; Dean of Theology and Chaplain of Kansas Industrial and Educational Institute, Topeka, Kansas, 1922-25; Teacher of Systematic Theology and New Testament Greek, American Baptist Theological Seminary 1924-38; Dean of Seminary October 28, 1927-39; Acting President, April 8, 1930-April 12, 1932. Although Dr. Garnett was never honored with the elective office of President, it is

to his credit and honor that the American Baptist Theological Seminary stands as a beacon-light today, for it was through his efforts that many of the problems of administration were solved. His memory is retained through the annual Garnett-Nabrit lecture series each year.



NABRIT, JAMES MADISON -- Clergyman, Educator b. September 17, 1877, Atlanta, Georgia. s. J. Clarke and Margaret (Knox Petty) Nabrit; m. Augusta G. West, May 5, 1899; eight children, James M. Jr., Samuel M., Ann, Gertrude, Henry, Lois, Margaret, Cecella; educ. Morehouse College, Atlanta, Georgia A.B., D.D.); Virginia Union Seminary Richmond, Virginia (M.A.) Morris College (D.D.) Chicago, Illinois; Pastor, St. James Church, Forsyth, Georgia 1902-07; Bethesda Church, Americus, Georgia, 1907-12; Springfield Baptist Church, Augusta, Georgia, 1912-21; Mt. Olive Baptist Church, Atlanta Georgia 1921-36; Teacher, Central College 1899-1907; Americus Institute 1907-12; Walker Institute 1915-20; Trustee Morehouse and Atlanta Universities, Atlanta, Georgia; General Secretary of the National Baptist Convention, Inc. 1931-1946; President of Georgia Baptist Convention: Elected president of American Baptist Theological Seminary April 23, 1936. Six months after accepting this position he suffered a severe back injury which left him a half invalid, nevertheless the school experienced its greatest encouragement and the ground work for this institution was liad during his administration Dr. Nabrit resigned in order to resume the pastorate in Atlanta, Georgia. He died there in 1947.

HISTORY OF THE GARNETT-NABRIT LECTURES

"...they...expounded unto him the way of God more perfectly."
--Acts 18:26B

Even in the midst of learning situations, there come moments when that which is learned need be enhanced, enriched and enlightened. This concept seemingly was in the mind of Dr. J. C. Miles as he, under the leadership of Dr. J. M. Nabrit, the President of the American Baptist Theological Seminary, directed the first Missionary Conference in March, 1937. An Annual Conference on Pastoral Problems was planned and held in November, 1937, which was closed with a celebration of Founder's Day. The conferences were combined at least by 1943 and continued each year until 1957.

In 1949 the conception of the Garnett-Nabrit lectures was realized.

At the Annual Meeting of the Alummi Association held, June 3, 1949, a committee (J. T. Moore, B. E. Callier, J. T. Ridley, W. N. Daniel, Charles Williams and William H. Donaldson) reported that they had polled the alumni throughout the country and received the majority of votes in favor of a Garnett-Nabrit Lectureship. This Lectureship was created and named for Drs. J. H. Garnett and J. M. Nabrit. Dr. Garnett had served as Dean of the Institution and was acting President at several interims. In 1936 he was elected President-Emeritus and was retired in 1940. The other personality was Dr. Nabrit, the Secretary of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., who served as President of the Seminary from 1936 to 1944.

It was not until 1957 that the birth of the Garnett-Nabrit Lectures was actualized. For in the April 30 - May 1, 1957 meeting of the Board of Trustees the vote was made to change the name of the Annual Ministers and Missionary Conference to the Garnett-Nabrit lectures in honor or the Former Dean, Dr. J. H. Garnett and Dr. J. M. Nabrit, the fourth President of the Seminary. The first Lecture Series was held April 30-May 1, 1958, under the co-directorship of Professor Joseph M. Conley, Director to Seminary Extension, and Dr. Maynard P. Turner, President. In 1964, the Alumni Association strengthened the Lecture Series by initiating an Alumni Banquet. Each year an Alumnus is chosen by the Alumni Association to deliver the Banquet Address. These Lecture Series have been blessed with the priceless contributions of the speakers listed on the next page.

FOCUS

For more than two hundred years the Constitution of this great nation has guided generations and races and cultures through conflict and trial, expansion and progress, and through war and peace. Limitations within the Constitution produced amendments. And amendments offered solutions abut solutions presented more problems.

No doubt, the amendment which survived the onslaught of opposition, for the Church, is encouched in the First and Fourteenth Amendments which assures the "Freedom of Religion." Yet today this very freedom is being challenged. The Madeline O'Hair mentality has produced decisions from the Supreme Court, Internal Revenue, Congress, State and Local Courts and Governments. Contrastingly, the election of Mr. Reagan has been colored by the influence of the Moral Majority - a church oriented body.

Just what IS and SHOULD BE the relationship between the church and the State? To these ends we direct our focus of our Lecture Series this year. Our theme - THE CHURCH AND STATE: SEPARATION AND/OR COOPERATION? - challenges us to realistically explore and understand the many aspects of a concept that reflects this nation's history and affects this nation's destiny. Our Forum Sessions will provide meaningful opportunities to confront our theme from the following focal points:

- The Church and Tax Exemption
- II. Religious Expressions in the Public School
- III. The Church and Politics
- IV. The Minister as an Agent of the State
- V. State Regulations and the Church Related School

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES



DR. HARVEY G. COX: LECTURER - Currently serving as the Victor S. Thomas Professor of Divinity and Chairman of the Department of Applied Theology at the Harvarc University Divinity School, Dr. Cox brings to our Lecture Series a wealth of experience and insight. He holds the A. B. degree from the University of Pennsylvania with honors in history; the B. D. degree from Yale University Divinity School and the Ph.D. in History and Philosophy of Religion from Harvard University.

Dr. Cox is a noted Professor, Lecturer and Writer. He has been Guest Lecturer at several American Colleges and Universities including the University of California Notre Dame University and Loyola University. He has also lectured at the American College in Rome; the University of Madrid; the Pontifica Universidad Catolica in Lima, Peru; the Waldensan Seminary of Rome;

The Dharmaram University (RC) In Bangalore, India; the Union Theological Seminary in Buenos Aires, and the Christian Institute for the Study of Japanese Religion in Kyoto, Japan.

A member of the Editorial Boards of the Harvard Theological Review and of Christianity and Crises, Dr. Cox has had numerous articles, interviews, reviews published. Dr. Cox has also authored several books, including The Secular City, God's Revolution and Man's Responsibility, On Not Leaving It to the Snake and The Feast of Fools. Two other books have received literary distinctions: The Seduction of the Spirit was nominated for the National Book Price; Turning East was an alternate for the Book of the Month Club and was also selected by the American Committee for display at the Moscow Book Fair.



DR. EDWARD V. HILL: PREACHER - The pastor of the Mount Zion Baptist Church of Los Angeles, California, Dr. Hill brings some twenty - six years of pastoral experience to challenge our thinking and theology in this Lecture Series. Holding the B. S. degree from Prairie View A & M College in Prairie View, Texas; the M. S. degree in Psychology from Union University in New Port Beach, California and the honorary L.L.D. degree from Union Baptist Tehological Seminary in Houston, Texas. Dr. Hill is also the President of the California State Baptist Convention. Inc.: Consul General to the Republic of Liberia: State Vice - President of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc.; Chairman of the National Concerned Clergy for Evangelism; Member of the Board of Directors of the Billy Graham Association and World Impact. Dr. Hill is also a Lecturer for the Billy Graham School of Evangelism and the Women's Auxiliary of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc.

A noted preacher, Dr. Hill has received numerous citations and awards for his leadership and oratory abilities. Donors of these honors include the National Association of Media Women, Campus Crusade for Christ, World Vision, and the International Congress of World Evangelism. Dr. Hill has also been instrumental in recent efforts of the Moral Majority.
